A landscape shrouded in mystery

Follow in the footsteps of ore miners to the heart of the Ore Mountains. Tin placers near the town of Boží Dar represent a unique landscape formation, which arose as a result of intensive mining between the 16th and the 18th century and today is known as a famous local natural sight.

Hundreds of small mounds are visible even in aerial photographs. With an area of 250 000 m², it is one of the most extensive natural phenomena of this type in the country. Each mound can be up to 20 meters in length and 2 meters in height. You can also come across them in the direction of Myslivny and Ryžovna along the Černá river alongside the Tin road (Cínová stezka).

They are easily recognized from a distance thanks to their specific vegetation that differs from their surroundings.
